Comprehensive Plan

- The Comprehensive Plan guides development of City facilities
- McIntire is classified as a Regional Park in 2007 comp plan
- Purpose: This park classification includes larger parks that serve regionally and provide a variety of large-scale indoor or outdoor recreation facilities, or both, as well as facilities that are unique within the City. Areas designated for natural and/or cultural resource protection may also be included within these parks.
- These parks offer diverse experiences and activities that typically involve an individual or group for a time period of up to a day and which may attract large numbers of spectators or participants. Typical activities include those found in regional parks as well as facilities such as athletic complexes, recreation centers, nature centers, golf courses, indoor gymnasiums, indoor aquatic facilities. Sensitive environmental areas and cultural resource sites within the parks will be managed as Natural or Cultural Resource Areas.
- Other park classifications include Community, Neighborhood, and Urban

Needs Assessment (2005)

- The City hired a firm to survey households and individuals about Parks and Recreation needs.
- The park system was inventoried and compared to both national standards and local standards for facilities per capita.
- The Needs Assessment was used as input to the 2007 Comprehensive Plan



 - ~85% of new parkland is natural/passive area
 - 3 miles of new trails
 - Replaced pools at Onesty and Smith
 - 2 new spraygrounds: Greenleaf and Forest Hills
 - Davis Field addition rectangular field
 - Synthetic Turf at CHS
 - Renovation of CHS baseball and softball fields
 - Forest Hills Park renovation

McIntire Golf Course

- The McIntire Municipal Golf Park was established in 1938 as a public 9 hole sand green golf course.
- The golf course is part of the landscape of McIntire Park. This landscape is eligible for historic designation, but is not registered. There are no restrictions placed on changes to the landscape, but it must be photographed and documented, a task which has already been completed.

McIntire Golf Course

Current Use

- 7 holes remain (2 lost due to McIntire Road Extd.) and open for daily play.
- □ The daily fee for play is \$5.00.
- The course is not irrigated or fertilized and the only herbicide use is occasionally spraying Round-UpTM in the sand greens.
- The Meadowcreek Golf Course staff and The First Tee provide mowing and maintenance services.
- All golf revenue at McIntire Golf Course supports The First Tee of Charlottesville.

McIntire Golf Course visitation

Rounds from Public Play (paid by honor system)

FY11 3,143 rounds

The First Tee Rounds (in addition to public rounds)

2011 1900 youth rounds + 200 rounds by program volunteers and parents.

TOTAL Rounds played in 2011 = 5,243

- The First Tee of Charlottesville utilizes the McIntire facility 12-15 weekends and 36-40 weekdays for morning, afternoon and afterschool programming from April to November.
- Due to program growth The First Tee began using and managing the MMGP in April of 2008.

McIntire Wading Pool

- Built in 1930's
- Costs \$2 to \$4 per visit for children over 3 years old
- Supervised by 3 lifeguards
- Open from Memorial Day until Labor Day each year
- Total visitors in 2011 = 2,407


Skate Park

- Built in 1990's
- Supervised by 1 part-time staff person
- Open all year slower in the winter months
- Total visitors in 2011 = 10,107
- City and county share the cost of operations




McIntire Botanical Garden Vision






- Majority of land as Park/Botanical Garden


