## City Voters Reject Ward Referendum

In a reversal of last November's decision, Charlottesville voters Tuesday defeated by a 58 to 42 percent margin the second advisory referendum on changing the form of city council.

Asked whether they wanted to switch to a mixed ward and atlarge form of representation, Charlottesville's electorate cast 3,382 no votes and 2,453 yes votes — a margin of 929 out of a total of 5,835, according to the city registrar's office.

In November's gubernatorial election, the referendum passed by a 52 to 48 percent margin — 2,642 to 2,418. But city council asked for a second vote because of the narrow, 224-vote margin and the fact that only 48 percent of those who cast votes in the gubernatorial race also voted in the referendum.

But with 84 percent of those who voted in Tuesday's city council election also casting votes in the referendum, council members said Tuesday night that they had received a clear signal against changing the form of city government.

"I think it's a benefit for the community that it came out posi-
